St. Raphael Catholic Church in Englewood, Florida, contributed several interesting ideas and items.

The front page of their Sunday Bulletin presents a color photo of a wall hanging which depicts St. Raphael.

The parish has the practice of recognizing first-time visitors to Mass by presenting them with a St. Raphael medal and accompanying prayer.

The medal is the same design as used by the San Rafael Mission Church in California with "Pray for Us" on the reverse. The medals are made in Italy.

The Prayer:

Raphael, St. Dear your lovely means "God name heals." The Lord sent you to young Tobiah to guide him throughout a long journey. Upon his return you taught him how to cure his father's blindness. How natural. therefore, for Christians to pray for your powerful help for safe travel and a happy return. This is what we ask for ourselves as well as for all who are far from home.

St. Raphael in Vermont

St. Raphael the Archangel Catholic Church in Poultney, Vermont, celebrated its centennial in 2002. The pastor forwarded to us a copy of the centennial booklet. The church's stained glass window shows St. Raphael in the traditional style.



"Jewish Archangel"

The August 2003 issue of Catholic Digest contained a story by Sean Patrick about a Jewish doctor and his service in a Catholic New York neighborhood. The story began and ended with the doctor's awareness and devotion to St. Raphael and his ownership of a medallion of the saint. The story reminds us that, as a part of the Old Testament, the Book of Tobit and Raphael the Archangel are part of Jewish religious tradition. The story of Tobit is well known to those of Jewish background, unlike the Catholic saints of the New Testament and later.
