New Pastor for St. Raphael in St. Louis

On July 1, 2005, Msgr. William A. Drennan retired as pastor of St. Raphael in St. Louis. He had been pastor here for seventeen years and celebrated his fiftieth anniversary as a priest. He will reside as a retired priest in a parish in west St. Louis County.

It was at Msgr. Drennan's suggestion that this parish formed a history society to organize the miscellaneous aspects of parish history. He also encouraged the idea of this *Newsletter* to communicate with other St. Raphael parishes in the country.

The new pastor of St. Raphael in St. Louis is the Rev. James Grady. He has approved this issue and the purpose of the *Newsletter*.

Fire Damages the St. Raphael Cathedral at Madison, Wisconsin

In the early morning of March 14, 2005, fire began in the steeple area of the St. Raphael Cathedral in Madison, Wisconsin. The fire soon spread though the entire roof. The burning remains fell into the church and destroyed, damaged, or blackened the rest of the church. A transient arsonist had set the fire and offered no real motive for his actions.

The Cathedral had just replaced the original steeple with a new one. The parish had celebrated the 150th anniversary of the laying of the corner stone.

The stone church, begun in the 1850s, became a cathedral when Pope Pius XII created the Madison diocese in 1946. In 1954, the Church was renovated to meet the needs of a cathedral. There was another major renovation in 1973 to conform to the liturgical renewal called for by the Second Vatican Council.

In view of the extensive damage, it is not known at this time what the diocese will do about the structure. Currently, its parishioners are meeting at another location.

The town boasts an archaeological museum, which displays numerous artifacts from the area. Its place on the Mediterranean makes it a modern tourist spot.

The Redemptorist *Newsletter* of June/July 2005 contains an article, which refers to a new church in Lagos named for the archangels Raphael, Gabriel, and Michael. The Church is apparently still under construction.

St. Raphael in Los Angeles

The St. Raphael parish in Los Angeles is located in the inner city. The parish maintains a school, which serves some 300 children. It has been praised for its commitment to education at a time when many inner-city Catholic schools are closing. It has succeeded in finding financial support to provide computers, books, and operating expenses along with tuition support for more than sixty of the students. Recently, the John and Dorothy Shea Foundation provided a grant for a 9,000 square-foot parish center addition.

How many other St. Raphael parishes are in the inner-city?


St. Raphael in Baghdad, Again

Last year the *Newsletter* reported about the Saint Raphael Hospital in Baghdad, located across the river from the green zone headquarters of the U.S. forces and the new Iraqi government. The 86 bed, three story hospital is run by the Dominican Sisters. It is still very much in operation and has recently received medicine, medical supplies, and a generator (needed because of the constant failure of electrical power in the capital) from the Order of Malta. Despite the unsettled conditions, the hospital is expanding by adding an out-patient clinic. It continues to serve the civilian population of the city and the rural regions around Baghdad.

In view of the ongoing problems there, we should remember the hospital and its staff and patients in our prayers.
