### *Seminarian Speakers*

We welcome our two seminarians Shajir and Jacob who will be speaking to us about the upcoming Seminary Christmas Collection. This traditional collection helps to pay for the day-to-day needs of the seminary. Please consider generously giving to our great seminary this year through this collection.

### *Vocations*

This week, we received some startling statistics on the numbers of active priests we can expect in parish ministry in the next 20 years.

By 2026, the Archdiocese will have enough active priests to cover each parish in the Archdiocese with one priest (approximately 170). The Archdiocese will not be able to really cover all of the parishes with one priest, though, as our larger parishes require multiple priests to cover the sacramental life in those parishes. In about four years from today, then, we will need to have alternatives for staffing some parishes due to not having priests for those parishes. Unfortunately, the situation with the numbers of priests will continue to get bleaker. By 2030, we will have 150 active priests and by 2040, 130 active priests.

We have heard of such priest shortages in other dioceses for years. Since I was a kid, it has been said the day is coming for our Archdiocese. Unfortunately, that day is now around the corner.

Fewer priests means fewer Masses, fewer times for confessions, potential longer waits for funerals, trouble finding a priest to celebrate a wedding on a desired wedding date, and ultimately, alternative models for how our parishes will run on a day-to-day basis.

There are certainly some large issues here we cannot solve. What we can do is to pray for vocations to the priesthood and to the religious life and do more to create a culture where vocations can be explored.

To that end, we will be bringing back the vocational chalice at Sunday Masses. This is an effort to promote and pray for vocations that we started before the pandemic and had to halt with the lockdowns in 2020.

In January, we will begin having a Signup Genius where families can signup to take the vocational chalice home after a Sunday Mass for a week of family prayer focused on vocations. The chalice can then be brought back either to the parish office on Friday before noon or on Satur-

day morning to the church.

As we begin to focus on vocations more, let us all individually pray for our priests, seminarians, and that the Lord open the hearts of young people to follow Him by being a priest or a religious .

### *Advent Healing Services*

Thank you to all of those who participated in our second Advent Healing Service this past Monday night.
