

FR. JOHN'S DIGITAL QUILL FOR SPIRITUAL MUSINGS AND PARISH NEWS

As I take up my modern day quill (also known nation right now? as a keyboard) on Tuesday afternoon, St. Louis is in a concerning state. This past week, four police officers were shot and a retired police captain was killed. Our city is under a curfew and when one turns on the news, one observes conversations about racism, live videos of people protesting acts of violence, and robberies taking place.

I do not know where our nation will be when you read these words this weekend. What I do know is this: we are living in times of change. We knew our lives were going to be different due to the Coronavirus. The events in these days signal there will be even more changes to the world we knew when the calendar turned to 2020.

Change can be disconcerting and uncomfortable, especially when speaking about the issue of race in America. We can feel that this conversation has gone on for too long already, that we have already changed enough, or that this issue is for someone else to deal with and to solve. I can understand such voices, as I feel some of these voices vying for attention in me.

The reality is that the only person I can control is me. I have control over my beliefs, attitudes, words, and actions. If I want something to be different in our country...if I want this cycle of violence in our cities to end...then I am the one that needs to ask if I need to change, even if it is just a little bit, for the greater good.

It is right and proper we do this. We are American Catholics! This year, the History Day project our school participated in was all about breaking barriers. We as Americans pride ourselves on being the first to harness a good swath of the American continent, break the sound barrier, and put people on the moon. In doing these things that people said were impossible, we broke barriers in our hearts and said, yes, we could and would do those.

We can take this attitude and combine it with the Catholic challenge of metanoia. This word simply means conversion. We as Catholics are called to constantly look at our lives, to see where we need to change, and respond to the call of Christ to do that. We are confident that He will forgive us for our past wrongs, give us the grace to make the change, and sustain us in our new path forward.

I urge you to look later in our bulletin at some statements from our bishops, the Catechism, and an examination of conscience concerning this issue of race. Take some time and prayerfully consider it. Is Christ calling me to the change that is needed in our

From Archbishop Carlson:

The acts of violence rooted in racism that we are seeing in Minneapolis bring forth the echoes of a pain that we are sadly all too familiar with in the greater St. Louis region.

My thoughts and prayers join those of my brother Archbishop Bernard A. Hebda in my hometown of Minneapolis as we pray for the repose of the soul of Mr. George Floyd.

I encourage all of those feeling pain at the loss of another African American male, brutally killed as others watched, to find strength in the words of St Augustine of Hippo: "Hope has two beautiful daughters. Their names are anger and courage; anger at the way things are, and courage to see that they do not remain the way they are."

This weekend the faithful across the Archdiocese of St. Louis are asked to offer their prayers for Peace and Justice, and for a greater respect for all life.

From Archbishop Jose Gomez, Archbishop of Los Angeles and President of the US Conference of Catholic Bishops

The killing of George Floyd was senseless and brutal, a sin that cries out to heaven for justice. How is it possible that, in America, a black man's life can be taken from him while calls for help are not answered, and his killing is recorded as it happens?

I am praying for George Floyd and his loved ones, and, on behalf of my brother bishops, I share the outrage of the black community and those who stand with them in Minneapolis, Los Angeles, and across the country. The cruelty and violence he suffered does not reflect on the majority of good men and women in law enforcement, who carry out their duties with honor. We know that. And we trust that civil authorities will investigate his killing carefully and make sure those responsible are held accountable.

We should all understand that the protests we are seeing in our cities reflect the justified frustration and anger of millions of our brothers and sisters who even today experience humiliation, indignity, and unequal opportunity only because of their race or the color of their skin. It should not be this way in America. Racism has been tolerated for far too long in our way of life.

It is true what Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. said, that riots are the language of the unheard? We should be doing a lot of listening right now. This time, we should not fail to hear what people are saying through their pain. We need to finally root out the racial injustice that still infects too many areas of

American society.

But the violence of recent nights is self-destructive and self-defeating. Nothing is gained by violence and so much is lost. Let us keep our eyes on the prize of true and lasting change.

Legitimate protests should not be exploited by persons who have different values and agendas. Burning and looting communities and ruining the livelihoods of our neighbors, do not advance the cause of racial equality and human dignity.

We should not let it be said that George Floyd died for no reason. We should honor the sacrifice of his life by removing racism and hate from our hearts and renewing our commitment to fulfill our nation's sacred promise — to be a beloved community of life, liberty, and equality for all.

From the Catechism of the Catholic Church

1935 The equality of men rests essentially on their dignity as persons and the rights that flow from it: Every form of social or cultural dis crimination in fundamental personal rights on the grounds of sex, race, color, social conditions, language, or religion must be curbed and eradicated as incompatible with God's design.40

Examination of Conscience from the USCCB

- 1. Have I fully loved God and fully loved my neighbor as myself?
- 2. Have I caused pain to others by my actions or my words that offended my brother or my sister?
- 3. Have I done enough to inform myself about the sin of racism, its roots, and its historical and contemporary manifestations? Have I opened my heart to see how unequal access to economic opportunity, jobs, housing, and education on the basis of skin color, race, or ethnicity, has denied and continues to deny the equal dignity of others?
- 4. Is there a root of racism within me that blurs my vision of who my neighbor is?
- 5. Have I ever witnessed an occasion when someone "fell victim" to personal, institutional, systematic or social racism and I did or said nothing, leaving the victim to address their pain alone?
- 6. Have I ever witnessed an occasion when someone "fell victim" to personal, institutional, systematic or social racism with me inflicting the pain, acting opposite of love of God and love of neighbor?
- 7. Have I ever lifted up and aided a person who "fell victim" to personal, institutional, systematic or social racism and paid a price for extending mercy to the other? How did I react? Did my faith grow? Am I willing to grow even more in faith through my actions?


