Many of us have been in situations where the subject of faith comes up in conversation and we start out trying to evangelize but end up trying to win an argument. Afterwards, we realize that we didn't help the persons draw closer to Jesus and may have actually pushed them further away.

Here are some things to keep in mind the next time this happens:

Mercy/Compassion Our attitudes can set the tone of how the conversation will go. We all have baggage, since no one is perfect. We all need some level of healing. Don't focus on people's mistakes. Try to establish a tone of mercy and compassion, regardless of how hard someone may be trying to argue. Remember "slow to anger." This is not a game that we are trying to win. Rather, this is a soul in need of transformation.

<u>Build Relationship</u> Look at the conversation as an opportunity to build a friendship and not as a one-time event. People questioning the faith may mean still be open and curious about it. It may be a way of asking for help. People have a fear of being wrong, of being humiliated or looking stupid. Recognize that, although their words may be harsh on the surface, they do not really convey what is in their hearts. Building a relationship takes time, patience, and forgiveness. Offer to accompany them on their quest for understanding.

Humility Friendship is based on trust. The seed of trust is humility. When we take off our masks and reveal to each other what is in our hearts, friendship blossoms and grows. Unfortunately, pride and ego get in the way. Let us exercise humility; be good listeners. Let us listen to understand and clarify, and not to give the "right" answer or box someone into a corner.

<u>Common Ground</u> Don't assume you know what people are thinking just because they aren't actively living

their Catholic faith. Making judgments escalates arguments and diminishes true understanding. Ask good questions; ask them why they believe what they believe. What sources of information do they refer to? Keep asking "why" to get to the root cause. Encourage critical thinking and do not rely just on second-hand information from a sound bite. Archbishop Rozanski says, "We want to open a door rather than push them through a door."

Share Your Story No one knows your relationship with the Holy Trinity better than you! No one can argue with you on how you came to believe what you believe. Share your trials, pain, and suffering, as well as your love, joy, and peace. Remember, there is no resurrection unless there is death. You must "die" to your old ways before you can "rise" to a new life with Jesus.

<u>Truth</u> Today, many people say the "the truth for me is...." They see truth as a concept that is adaptable to justify a current lifestyle. Introduce them to the idea that the Truth is really a person – Jesus ("I am the way and the truth and the life"). Truth is not relative; it is absolute. It is true for all of us, over all of time. People are influenced by culture. People follow little voices in their heads (which may be evil spirits disguised as good). Or, people may not know that God is an option. Truth leads people to Jesus.

<u>Pray</u> Let us offer to pray and let them know that we will continue to pray for them. Prayer builds hope and combats despair. We are not responsible for convincing people, but we are responsible for presenting the Truth. We plant the seeds and the Holy Spirit does the work.

## The Fourth Week of Advent

- Take some time for Eucharistic Adoration on Monday or Wednesday from 3:00-9:00pm
- Receive the Sacrament of Confession. We will have a special time Wednesday evening this week, beginning at 6:00pm and going until 8:00pm or until everyone has had a chance to receive the sacrament.
- Prayerfully read one of the Gospel accounts in Matthew or Luke about the Nativity or just sit with the nativity scene in your home in quiet meditation.
  - Pray the ARRR Prayer.
- Just pause for a few moments with an invocation as simple as "Jesus," or "Jesus, I need you."

May each of us see this week not just as a time to rush through to Christmas, but a period to run up the Advent score so we are prepared to welcome the Newborn King.
