This is my final column that I am penning as your pastor. On Monday, I will be at the 7:00am Mass and taking care of some final items here later that day. In other words, to quote Monsignor Stehly, the bottom line is can we enter the reality after August 1 with that spirit of teamwork and collaboration from which great things come?

Know that I will be ever grateful for my five years at St. Raphael the Archangel Parish. You have helped me to grow as a person and as a priest.
