Reading I Sir 3:2-6, 12-14

#### From St. Vincent de Paul Society



#### **Eucharistic Adoration**

Due to the Christmas Holiday, we will cancel Eucharistic Adoration this week and will resume Eucharistic Adoration next Wednesday, January 5, 2022.

#### Mass Schedule Next Weekend

Typically, there is a "Last Mass of the Year," which is one of my personal favorites, on December 31, at 4:30pm.

Due to January 1 falling on a Saturday, though, the Feast of Mary, Mother of God, is NOT a Holy Day of Obligation this year.

The only Mass on December 31 is at 7:00am, which will be the last Mass of this calendar year at St. Raphael. We will have one Mass for the Feast of Mary, Mother of God at 7:00am on January 1, 2022. Confessions will precede Holy Mass as normal on January 1.

Unlike last weekend with Christmas, the Feast of Mary, Mother of God does not trump the Sunday celebration of the Epiphany. The Saturday evening Mass on January 1 will thus count for the Sunday obligation. Our Mass schedule then for next Sunday will return to normal at 4:30pm on Saturday, January 1, and 8:00 and 10:00am on Sunday, January 2. We will also have confessions before the 4:30pm Mass from 3:45-4:20pm.

#### A Grateful Look Back

2021 was a year filled with God's graces here at St. Raphael.

Late in January, we began Catholic Schools Week differently. Instead of having an Open House with tours to prospective families, we gave more individual tours. Such a change due to the pandemic was blessed as we opened school with a higher enrollment than that of 2020.

In February, we had a virtual Black and Gold Dinner Auction. We livestreamed from the church, and

many people joined the fun remotely in different ways. Although different from what we were used to, we were together in spirit as a community.

We focused on the Sacrament of Reconciliation in Lent. Our Lenten Project for the Father Dickson's Cemetery doubled our financial goal, and we had two successful work days concluding with Mass.

We welcomed Archbishop Rozanski for the first time to our parish in April as he celebrated the Sacrament of Confirmation with our 7th graders. The celebrations of First Holy Communion and graduation were held in May, and we successfully concluded our first year of in-person learning after the pandemic.

In June, we renewed our parish Act of Consecration to the Sacred Heart, celebrated Corpus Christi Sunday, and I went door-to-door again offering blessings to families and to homes.

In August, we re-opened school again a bit more normally and welcomed servers back to Mass. We also had our 5th graders start serving shortly after the start of the year.

Our parish held a study of *Laudato Si* and is currently studying the *Acts of the Apostles*. Our Men's Club once again held its Golf Tournament in October and the Ladies 'Club had a wine tasting in November and a modified but very successful Advent by Candlelight in December.

This fall also saw the return of sports to St. Raphael. Our students played soccer and volleyball this past sports season and are practicing for the start of basketball season right after the new year.

We are slowly returning to more in-person events, with our Parish Picnic, Donut Sundays, Men's Club, Ladies' Club, Knights of Columbus, and leadership committees moving to more in-person meetings.

This Advent, we prayed for healing in our parish community, between our priests and our parish, and between our parish and the Archdiocese.

## GUEST COLUMN: START WITH THE END IN MIND BY DAVID BARANOWSKI ARCHDIOCESAN DIRECTOR OF PARISH STEWARDSHIP AND LEADERSHIP FORMATION

When planning a trip, baking a cake, or starting an exercise routine, we usually visualize the end result and make the proper preparations to achieve the desired result. Successful companies do this all the time. They plan, prepare, adjust, and allocate resources to achieve their goal. If you want to be successful, one of the things you should do is start with the end in mind.

Management guru and author of the book *The Seven Habits of Highly Effective People*, Dr. Stephen Covey, lists starting with the end in mind as the second habit of highly effective people. Effective people have the ability to envision in their minds the end result before they actually begin doing anything.

Maybe more of us should apply this concept to our relationship with the Holy Trinity.

In the first book of the Bible, *Genesis*, we are told that "God created mankind in His image." The very first sentence of the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* tells us that "God freely created man to make him share in his own blessed life." We were created by God to know and love Him. We know that we were created and we know why we were created. However, do we keep "the end in mind" - eternal life with God in Heaven - as we make our daily decisions on how to live our lives and to use the gifts that God has entrusted to each of us?

St. John the Baptist is depicted in many works of art with his finger pointing. Why? He is pointing to Jesus – the Lamb of God. In John's Gospel, St. John the Baptist says"He (Jesus) must increase; I must decrease." These words are a clear and concise daily reminder for us to start with the end in mind.

St. Paul in his *Letter to the Colossians* reminds us to "think of what is above, not of what is on earth." Unfortunately, too many people set their sights too low; they don't reach for Heaven. And, unfortunately, too many people are focused inward on their own desires and not open to what God, the Creator, created each of us to do.

Starting with the end in mind doesn't make things any easier, but it does keep us focused on the goal - Heaven. God has given each of us a plan. Let's be open to what God may be calling us to do and invite others to share in God's love, mercy, and forgiveness.

Every decision we make either moves us closer to God or moves us farther away. Start with the end in mind and experience the joy and peace that God wants for each one of us here on earth and eternally with Him in Heaven.

#### From Pope Francis's Angelus Message December 27, 2020

A few days after Christmas, the liturgy invites us to turn our eyes to the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary and Joseph. It is good to reflect on the fact that the Son of God wanted to be in need of the warmth of a family, like all children. Precisely for this reason, because it is Jesus' family, the family of Nazareth is the model family, in which all families of the world can find their sure point of reference and sure inspiration. In Nazareth, the bad things and often someone is offended by this: "I springtime of the human life of the Son of God began to blossom at the moment he was conceived by the work of the Holy Spirit in the virginal womb of Mary. Within the welcoming walls of the House of Nazareth, Jesus' childhood unfolded in joy, surrounded by the maternal attention of Mary and the care of Joseph, in whom Jesus was able to see God's tenderness (cf. Apostolic Letter Patris Corde, 2).

In imitation of the Holy Family, we are called to rediscover the educational value of the family unit. It requires being founded on the love that always regenerates relationships, opening up horizons of hope. Within the family one can experience sincere communion when it is a house of prayer, when affections are serious, profound, pure, when forgiveness prevails over discord, when the daily harshness of life is softened by mutual tenderness and serene adherence to God's will. In this way, the family opens itself up to the joy that God gives to all those who know how to give joyfully. At the same time, it finds the spiritual energy to be open to the outside world, to others, to serving brothers and sisters, to cooperation in building an ever new and better world; capable, therefore, of becoming a bearer of positive stimuli; the family evangelizes by the example of life. It is true that there are problems, and at times arguments in every family. "Father, I argued...." But we are human, we are weak, and we all quarrel within the family at times. I will tell you something: if you quarrel within the family, do not end the day without making peace. "Yes, I quarreled," but before the end of the day, make peace. And do you know why? Because a cold war, day after day, is extremely dangerous. It does not help. And then, in the family there are three words, three phrases that must always be held dear: "Excuse me." "Thank you," and "Sorry." "Excuse me." so as not to be intrusive in the life of others.

"Excuse me: may I do something? Do you think I can do this? Excuse me." Always, not being intrusive. "Excuse me," the first phrase. "Thank you": so much help, so much service that we do for one another within the family. Always say thank you. Gratitude is the lifeblood of the noble soul. "Thank you." And then, the hardest one to say: "I am sorry." Because we always do some am sorry," "I am sorry." Do not forget the three phrases: "Excuse Me," "Thank You," and "I am sorry." If there are these three phrases in a family, in a family environment, then the family is fine.

May the Virgin Mary, whom we now address with the Angelus prayer, grant that families throughout the world be increasingly fascinated by the evangelical ideal of the Holy Family, so as to become leaven of a new humanity and of a concrete and universal solidarity.

And today I entrust each family to the Lord, especially those most tried by life's difficulties and by the scourges of misunderstanding and division. May the Lord, born in Bethlehem, grant them all the serenity and strength to walk together in the way of goodness.


And do not forget these three phrases that will help so much to achieve family unity: "excuse me" not to be intrusive, to respect others — "thank you" to mutually thank each other within the family — and "sorry" when we do something bad. And this "sorry" or when we quarrel — please say it before the day ends; make peace before the day ends.
