DMI Results: Core Catholic Teaching on the Resurrection

In March, our parish participated in the Disciple Maker Index as part of the All Things New process in the Archdiocese. As part of this process, parishioners were asked their views on six key aspects of Catholic teaching.

Each week over the next six weeks, I will highlight one of the beliefs asked about. I will give the results from the DMI to give a snapshot of how our parish generally views the topic and then discuss the teaching of the Church on that topic. While these articles will certainly not exhaust the topic discussed, it will hopefully be a refresher for people on what the Church teaches and also an encouragement to look at the resources provided for more information on that topic.

The first topic is the Resurrection: the belief that on Easter Sunday Jesus truly rose body and soul from the dead. Not surprisingly, our parish is very rooted in this belief. Seventy-eight percent of parishioners surveyed strongly agreed that Jesus rose from the dead, 13% agreed, and 6% were unsure. There were answers of 1% for neutral, disagree, and strongly disagree.

Whenever I think about the topic of the Resurrection, I think of the photo above from the Cathedral. In it, three moments of faith about the death and resurrection of Jesus are captured. On the right is the centurion who witnesses to Jesus' divinity immediately after Jesus' death. (cf. Mt. 27:54) On the left is the story from Luke of Jesus' appearance to the disciples on the road to Emmaus. (cf. Lk 24:13-32) In the center is the story of Jesus as he reveals Himself to Mary Magdalene on Easter Sunday morning. (cf. Jn 20:11-18) Beneath these images is a powerful text, "If Christ has not risen, your faith is vain."

If Jesus has not been raised from the dead, then each Sunday, when we gather to worship, we worship a dead man. Certainly, a dead man who had radical teachings that changed the world and can change our lives, but still, a dead man. His name would not promise life beyond the grave. Instead, we would simply gather to remember a man who taught us a nice way to live. But it would be a way of life among other possible ways of living as proposed by other philosophers and religious figures. It would certainly not be, "...the way, the truth, and the life." (Jn 14:6)

Additionally, if Jesus is not raised from the dead, the other sacraments are powerless. Baptizing as Jesus taught would not bring an end to original sin. A priest could forgive us of our sins in the name of Christ and of the Church, but what purpose would it hold? Why long to receive the Eucharist? Could the bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ? Why would I want to eat the flesh and drink the blood of someone who is not truly alive, but dead?

Reflecting the earliest teachings of the apostles and Christians, we have to hold that Jesus truly rose from the dead, body and soul, on Easter Sunday. This truth affirms, once and for all, that Jesus truly is the Son of God and that He has the authority to give us life in His name. (cf. *Catechism of the Catholic Church* #651)

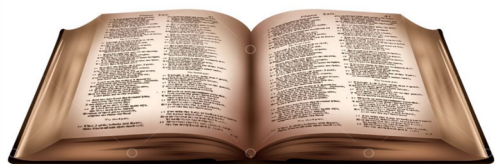
