

Reflection From Pope Francis from the Synod on the Synod Part 1: Encountering the Lord

The first is *encounter*. The Gospel passage begins by speaking of an encounter. A man comes up to Jesus and kneels down before him, asking him a crucial question: "Good Teacher, what must I do to inherit eternal life?" (v. 17). So important a question requires attention, time, willingness to encounter others, and sensitivity to what troubles them. The Lord does not stand aloof; he does not appear annoyed or disturbed. Instead, he is completely present to this person. He is open to encounter. Nothing leaves Jesus indifferent; everything is of concern to him. Encountering faces, meeting eyes, sharing each individual's history. That is the closeness that Jesus embodies. He knows that someone's life can be changed by a single encounter. The Gospel is full of such encounters with Christ, encounters that uplift and bring healing. Jesus did not hurry along, or keep looking at his watch to end the meeting. He was always at the service of the person he was with, listening to what he or she had to say.

As we initiate this process, we too are called to become experts in the *art of encounter*. Not so much by organizing events or theorizing about problems, but in taking time to encounter the Lord and one another. Time to devote to prayer and to adoration – that form of prayer that we so often neglect – devoting time to adoration, and to hearing what the Spirit wants to say to the Church. Time to look others in the eye and listen to what they have to say, to build rapport, to be sensitive to the questions of our sisters and brothers, to let ourselves be enriched by the variety of charisms, vocations and ministries. Every encounter – as we know – calls for openness, courage, and a willingness to let ourselves be challenged by the presence and the stories of others. If at times we would rather take refuge in formality or presenting the proper image – the clerical and courtly spirit, where I am more *Monsieur l'abbé* than *Father* – the experience of encounter changes us; frequently it opens up new and unexpected possibilities. Following today's Angelus, I will meet with a group of street people who came together simply because a group of people made an effort to listen to them, sometimes just to listen to them. And from that listening they succeeded in setting out on a new path. So often God points out new paths in just this way. He invites us to leave our old habits behind. Everything changes once we are capable of genuine encounters with him and with one another, without formalism or pretense, but simply as we are.

Weekly Devotion in Honor of the Year of St. Joseph

"I have a great love for St. Joseph, because he is a man of silence and strength. On my table, I have an image of St. Joseph sleeping. Even when he is asleep, he is taking care of the Church! Yes! We know that he can do that. So when I have a problem, a difficulty, I write a little note and I put it underneath St. Joseph, so that he can dream about it! In other words, I tell him: 'Pray for this problem!" - Pope Francis

St. Raphael the Archangel Mass Attendance Summary Report Fall, 2021

On behalf of our parish leadership, I am providing this report to our parish community to facilitate a conversation about Mass attendance in our parish.

Since arriving at St. Raphael, I have tried to be more open and transparent about where we are as a parish community. To that end, we have provided each fall a comprehensive annual report on our parish finances and sacramental data for the past year, as well as have opportunities for conversations about where we are on these important indicators of our health and vibrancy, both formally and informally.

Our Sunday Mass attendance is another point of data the Archdiocese looks at to see the vibrancy of our community. While Mass attendance may not tell the full story, it gives an indication of the effectiveness of the primary parish mission of proclaiming the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Like most churches, both Catholic and not, our parish has seen a decline over the past ten years in attendance at Sunday Mass. In 2011, the average Mass attendance per Sunday was as follows:

In October of 2019 prior to the pandemic, our Mass attendance was as follows:

In the past weeks, our parish has conducted another Mass count. Here are our averages from this count:

In the past 10 years, our parish has on average lost 215 persons (171 factoring virtual attendance) attending Mass on Sunday. It is a hard, sobering number to report to our community.

Two questions immediately arise. First, how many additional people did we lose because of the pandemic? Second, would we see better numbers if the mask mandate were lifted, as some are going to Mass elsewhere where there is no mask mandate?

Before the pandemic, we were losing approximately 17 persons per year at Mass. We should expect, then, around 34 fewer people at Mass to account for the two years of the pandemic. Our Mass attendance this year, then should be about 410 persons. This is just 5 persons off if we factor in those attending virtually each week at Mass. We can thus conclude that the pandemic has had some impact on our Mass attendance, but that our numbers would be roughly the same if the pandemic had never occurred.

While I am sure some families would return to Mass at St. Raphael should the mask mandate change, I did not notice a large drop-off of persons after the mask mandate was instituted by the city in July 2021. Thus, we cannot expect a change of the mask mandate to significantly alter our Mass attendance numbers.

The buck stops with the pastor. I share in the blame for not reversing this troubling trend in our community. As pastor, I am called to be the shepherd and evangelizer in our area. But I am not the only evangelizer or the sole person responsible to make sure everyone comes to Mass every Sunday. The Church makes it clear that the community shares in this responsibility to evangelize and outreach, encouraging the people to attend Mass.

In sharing this responsibility, I have heard some suggestions over the years. These range from the music played at Mass, to no music Masses, to shorter Masses on Sundays. We have tried some of these things and other parishes and churches have as well. Such things can help slightly with Mass attendance, but they do not drive the growth we need to see to get us back to 2011 levels.

We need to look deeper as a community as to why our Mass attendance continues to decline and what we can do not just to stop the decline, but to begin the turnaround.

One factor may be to adjust our Mass times so they are more friendly to the reality of families needing to get kids to multiple games and activities over the course of a weekend. This is merely a suggestion of where we may need to look; there is no plan even to begin to look at this possibility.

Perhaps we need to make different investments in order to offer options for grade school and high school -age students on the weekend so their experience is more dynamic and meaningful. This may help to attract families to attend Mass on Sundays.

Or perhaps we need to look at offering more occasions to grow in faith as adults by adding opportunities to interact with the Sunday readings. Having these, may drive more attendance with chances to really understand the readings and see how they connect with life today.

Beyond such formalized program ideas, perhaps we just need to be more intentional about inviting others to Mass. We often invite others to social events in our community. Why not Sunday Mass and some time for food and fellowship afterward, if possible? Could a simple invitation to Mass help start a new trend for someone in our community, an idea that could grow to affect others as well?

These are but a few ideas of what we could do help bolster our Mass attendance. We are only limited by our imaginations of what we could create to make Sunday worship more attractive for people in our community.

I continue to be impressed by our ability to invent and reinvent dynamic events every year that are great experiences of community, fun, and faith. Our parish leadership and I now call on that same creativity and resourcefulness to look at this issue and what we need to do to build Mass attendance. Together, I know we can and will do this.

As these conversations evolve, I encourage you to talk to me or to a member of our parish council or stewardship committee about your ideas and suggestions. These groups will continue to meet and, with your input, discern how we will move forward to make Sunday a "don't-want-to-miss" worship experience.
